Year 1 are reading a selection of non-fiction texts about plants and animals.




Year 2 are reading a selection of non-fiction texts about Australia and rainforests.

I am delighted to see so many children doing Accelerated Reader quizzes. If your child has been unable to access quizzes, it maybe because they are trying to use the Home Connect link which is designed for parents to check their child's results.

Since March we have enabled children to use the hosted site, which gives them access to quizzes; so this is the one they should use.


They may also enjoy trying to read their favourite picture books. Enjoying books together really is the key to developing children's reading skills.

I like the Polar Bear books because they're very unique as they are both an adventure spy story, yet also a fantasy story at the same time. They are incredibly well illustrated with a few pictures throughout the books. The main concept is Stella Starflake Pearl makes friends with some junior explorers called Ethan, Beanie and Shay. They go on missions and explorations to help others in need. I like the way that Alex Bell writes as it gives me a lot of inspiration due to some great vocabulary. An interview with Mrs White



What is your favourite children's book and why?

That is such a hard question because there are so many excellent children's books. Every time I buy a new batch of books for the library there is a new favourite; but a book that stands out for me is Oi Frog! By Emily Gravett, which we bought a few years ago. When it arrived, I loved it so much that I just wanted to read it aloud, so Mrs Burman let me read it to her class straight away.

What book are you currently reading?

Giver of Stars by JoJo Moyes. It is set in Kentucky in the 1930s and is based on the true story of a group of women who set up a mobile library service on horseback. They rode out to remote areas delivering books to people who would not otherwise have had access to them. As well as being a really exciting story it explores issues of racial prejudice and women's autonomy.

Why is reading important to you?

I have read every day of my life since I learnt how, so it's actually hard to say why it is important to me - I just can't imagine not reading. Reading gives me the opportunity to experience different places, cultures and periods of history from the point of view of the characters involved. No other medium gives you such in-depth insight into the thoughts, beliefs and emotions of others.

Super Tato by Sue Hendra.


A supermarket hero with eyes everywhere and he has many adventures. Great illustrations too. I know that quite a few of you made potato book characters with our World Book Day week activities.
